SITE VISIT: revised notes dated 3rd July 2021

1.0 Purpose

The purpose of the meeting to inspect the completed works with the roofing contracts manager and agree and final snagging.

The roof was rigorously tested on Sunday 18th when there was rain for several hours. Fine slate dust was washed off the recently installed slates and has collected in the valleys.

2.0 The Rainwater Valley Repairs

Valley Trays

Works in single ply membrane are complete and just need all building debris removed and a good wash down.

Sumps, Chutes and Hoppers

Where lead has been kept it has been painted in grey membrane material to disguise it. **Abutment Flashings**

Many of the lead flashings stay in place, these are small elements of lead that are not worth stealing. Where they have been lost, they have been replaced in aluminium.

Chimney Flashings

The narrow valley next to the chimney and the associated lead flashings have been left in place. The debris needs to be removed.

Cleaning

There is a certain amount of builders' debris and old detritus from before the theft. Adam assures me that this will all be carefully removed before the scaffold is struck.

3.0 **Slating Repairs**

Nave: North Pitch

Welsh slate circa 2007

The exposed battens and breathing sarking felt are in good condition and just needed cleaning down prior to reslating.

North Aisle: South Pitch

Welsh Slate circa 1900

The exposed battens are in acceptable condition and can be reused. The sarking boards are also in surprisingly good condition. Minimal patch repairs needed. The saw dust from these repairs found it way into the church. this will be cleaned up by the church wardens. **Chancel North Pitch**

Westmorland Green Slate, date unknown

Minimal damage and all in acceptable condition. The ridge pointing is poor, and light can be seen through it. The small patch repairs have been done with new blue Westmoreland because new green would have been double the cost.


IW requested a quote for patch repointing the ridge this will be done when the cleaning is done.

Vestry South Pitch

Welsh Slate size 20 x 12 inches.

This pitch has been re-laid on new breathing sarking and battens. In second hand Welsh slate. It looks particularly good work.








